SOARING TO NEW HEIGHTS: NALM AT 40 Called to Serve, Collaborate, Dream

NALM's 40th Anniversary celebration, beginning with our annual conference in Albuquerque June 1-4, is a time to look back at all the Lay Ministers, Religious Sisters and Brothers, and Priests who were the "founding mothers and fathers" of NALM. It is difficult to name them all for fear of leaving someone out but we are grateful for all the early pioneers in lay ministry who, shaped by the vision and teaching of Vatican II, came together to advocate for lay ministry.

The title of the Association is significant, National Association *for* Lay Ministry and not *of* Lay Ministry, as it has always been *for* the ministry of the Church as performed by its lay members. Central to NALM has been the goal of the formation of laity so that they are deeply grounded in the life and tradition of the Church.

Another objective of NALM is that of collaboration. Over the years, NALM has been the center of many projects that have shaped and emphasized the importance of lay ministry within the Church. These projects have included: co-sponsoring the Synod Conference on the Laity in 1987; the development of the watershed document, *Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord: A Resource for Guiding the Development of Lay Ecclesial Ministry*, and the continuation of the conversation on *Co-Workers* during the National Symposiums held at St. John's School of Theology and Seminary in Collegeville, Minnesota. The most significant of these collaborations was NALM's leadership in the *Emerging Models Project* which was a joint venture of six national Catholic associations to identify and promote new models of pastoral leadership that nurture, sustain, and empower vibrant Catholic parish communities in the United States.

NALM has been on the forefront in developing certification standards for lay ministers. The result of this effort are the *Competency-Based Standards for Pastoral Ministers*, *Pastoral Associates and Parish Life Coordinators*. NALM's leadership in developing these competencies led to the creation of the *Alliance for Certification of Lay Ecclesial Ministers* which is a joint effort of five national associations to affirm and promote lay ecclesial ministry in the United States.

NALM's many accomplishments also include: the publication of many books on the outcomes of the *Emerging Models Project* and the *Co-Workers in the Vineyard* study guide; the Home Mission Network and the creation of the NALM Advocacy committee in 2006. The Advocacy committee has been especially effective in composing two NALM position statements on Co-Workers and Lay Ecclesial Ministry Councils, the *Call to Ministry Stories* during the 2012 conference and collecting Lay Ministry Sunday resources that have been translated in several languages. NALM also had the honor of leading a pilgrimage to Rome to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Vatican II.

NALM's annual conference has been the catalyst for many of the concepts leading to these important projects. The conference has served as a valuable means for members to share their ideas for the future of lay ministry as well as network to receive support from their fellow Co-Workers in the Vineyard. NALM was able to have an influencial presence during the Bishop's 2015 Lay Ecclesial Ministry Summit

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through the work that was accomplished during the 2015 Conference at Catholic Theological Union for the 10 year anniversary of *Co-Workers in the Vineyard*. It is our hope that we will see many of you at this year's conference in Albuquerque June 1-4 so that we can add your voice to our plans for the future of NALM.

There is still much work for NALM to do in supporting, educating and advocating for lay ministers and for lay ministry in the Catholic Church but we know the members of NALM will continue to help us in our mission to *Serve*, *Collaborate and Dream* for a new generation of lay ministers.

ON THE GROUND IN ALBUQUERQUE

Our on-the-ground reporter, Keith Davis, has been sharing with us different ways conference attendees can get around and see Albuquerque. This month we focus on transportation options. The Albuquerque International Sunport is conveniently located 12 minutes or 5.5 miles from downtown Albuquerque, so transportation is fairly easy. Here are some choices:

- Sunport Shuttle (Sunsportshuttle.com) Pick up at the airport (outside the baggage claim area)
 \$11 one way, \$20 round trip. Reservations@Sunportshuttle.com or 866-505-4966
- Taxis Readily available outside of the baggage claim area. The normal charge is \$2.50 per mile
 but there may be surcharges for the airport which will bring that up a bit. This might be a good
 choice if you are travelling with someone as the added passenger fare is rather
 inexpensive. Cabs are also available at the hotel if you want to do some sightseeing.
- Car Rental If you plan on doing some sight-seeing, consider renting a car. There is a lot to see
 in New Mexico and if you haven't been here you won't want to miss the opportunity! All the
 major car rental companies are available. Take the car rental shuttle to the facility adjacent to
 the airport just a few minutes from the terminal.
- ABQ Ride (Bus): City Busses run regular routes from the Sunport to Downtown
 Albuquerque. You would have about a one block walk from the bus stop to the Hyatt. Bus #50
 picks up outside baggage claim at the end of the shuttle pick up area. Pick up is every half hour
 (on the hour). It takes about 15 minutes to get from the airport to the bus stop near the hotel.
 The fare is \$1 or you can get a one-day pass for \$2. There are also bus routes from near the
 hotel to all the major tourist areas, including Old Town. For route and schedule information, go

- Old Town Site-Seeing Tour: The Archdiocese of Santa Fe will provide a bus on Wednesday
 evening (after the pre-conference Institutes first session) to Old Town. You will be able to shop
 and have dinner. There is no charge for this service.



Book Review

To Heal, Proclaim, and Teach: The Essential Guide to Ministry in Today's Catholic Church (2016)


Okay, so I'm not going to lie. When I first picked up Jared Dees' new book, *To Heal, Proclaim, and Teach: The Essential Guide to Ministry in Today's Catholic Church* (Ave Maria Press, 2016), I was initially underwhelmed. Even a little bored. I mean, Dees was just saying stuff that's obvious over and over, that people in ministry know, right?

But I kept reading. And as I worked my way through the book, I realized that these characteristics are precisely what makes this book <u>so valuable</u>. Absolutely needed in American parish life. I cannot think of another book that summarizes the essential theology of evangelization in such an approachable, easy-to-reference way.

But this book is more than theology—it moves to a basic framework of practice that places all functions of typical parish life (that so many like to silo and separate) within the unity and <u>fullness of evangelization</u>. <u>READ MORE</u>
